A base word is a word that has meaning by itself.

Example: portrait = a painting, drawing, photograph, or engraving of a person

You can change the meaning of a base word by adding letters to the beginning or end of it.

Example: The word considered in the passage below has an -ed ending. Take away the ending, and

you have the base word *consider*.

Marking Note: Only underline a base word when it has added letters to its beginning or end.

A suffix is an ending attached to a base word to change its meaning.

Example: rich = (adjective) vivid and deep in color; *Her headband was a* rich *purple*.

rich(ness) = (noun) the quality of being pleasingly deep or strong in color; His painting

showed the true richness of colors.

When you mark a suffix, make sure it's attached to a base word and isn't part of the base word itself.

Example: (-er) in paint(er) = suffix because it's added to the base word paint

-er in father = not a suffix because the letters fath do not spell a word in English

A prefix is a group of letters attached to the beginning of a base word to change its meaning.

Example: usual = (adjective) common, used often; *She followed her* usual *route to the park*. unusual = (adjective) uncommon, rare; *She took an* unusual *route to the park* and almost got lost.

The prefix *un*- means *not*. It gives negative or opposite force to the base word it's attached to.
